

HOW TO TRANSFER TO UC'S WORKSHOP Newsletter Staff

On March 21st, counselor Erika Knox worked us through the available workshops on the SMC website. There are three sections dedicated to UC, CSU, and other public and private colleges and universities. For UC transfer students, the Transfer Center offers workshops on, including but not limited to, UC Application, Transfer Admission Guarantee (TAG), which is happening in September, and Personal Insight questions (PIQ).



The counselor introduced that UCs are more research and theoryoriented, whereas CSUs focus on a hands-on approach. When transferring to the UCs, larger classes can be more common. In addition, Blue and Gold covers California residents' systemwide tuition and fees



when one's family income is under \$80,000. According to Blue and Gold, "more than 56% of UC's California undergrads pay no tuition." To learn more about financial aid, please join the Show Me the Money workshop at SMC.

Minimum UC Admission Requirements include 60 UC transferable semester units, minimum GPA requirements (2.4 for residents and 2.8 for non-residents), and 7 Course patterns.

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The units can be checked by looking at one's unofficial transcript on Corsair Connect and completed by the time students graduate from SMC. Note that the mentioned **GPA** numbers are necessarily requirements but not competitive. Students can connect with a counselor at General Counseling and Transfer Center to make sure they are meeting the requirements.

Major preparation requirements are important to focus on for transfer students who want to be competitive, which is available on Assist.org. Major preparation is recommended to be completed by the semester students apply. SMC also has the Honors/Scholars Program, which offers the TAP program with UCLA that gives students special consideration.

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The program also connects students to the Transfer Honors Program at UCI and other colleges/universities. To learn more about the benefits and details of joining the program, please join the Scholar Information session. Students who might have benefited less from the Scholars Program are encouraged to look at other special programs, such as the STEM Program.

UCLA and UCs also compile two lists of the number of applicants, admit rate, and GPA range of admits. For students who are not

entirely sure about what they want to major in, these sites are great tools to explore potential majors that may be less competitive to get into.

UCs follow a holistic review, meaning that they consider not just GPA but also extracurricular activities, volunteering, hobbies, and work, just to name a few. Counselor then talked about special majors at each UC campus and opened up a Q&A time. She also mentioned that the full PowerPoint presentation can be found on 'Workshops' under 'Student Support.'

Attending workshops is a great way to know what SMC has to offer and ask questions. Students can also request a recording of workshops. Upcoming workshops can be found on the SMC website and socials and by joining AGS's weekly information meetings.

AGS has partnered with the organization Color a Smile to allow students and members to spread kindness and become aware of the impact they can have through a simple action that can be carried out from the commodity of their home. This is a Virtual Independent Volunteering Opportunity (VIVO) that offers service opportunities to those found in other areas of the country or world.

Color a Smile is a nonprofit organization founded in 1990. They carry the mission to spread happiness to seniors and military troops overseas through the mailing of colorful drawings.

People of all ages and abilities are kindly invited to spread joy, help others and be the cause of a genuine smile. Beyond the authentic reason of bringing joy and spreading happiness through drawings, Color a Smile also considers it essential to offer service opportunities to younger generations as believed that they will be more likely to serve in the future and become citizens of the world.

Since they first started, they have distributed over two million drawings. However, you might ask yourself; how much can a colored drawing actually impact a person? Well, Jerry and Susanne have shared the extensive feedback and thank you letters they have received from people who now hold those colorful drawings. As I carefully fill in the spaces in my drawing with my colored pencils, I am filled with joy, knowing that the person receiving that artwork will probably smile due to the energy and intention with which I fill the gaps.



Besides transmitting happiness, AGS through its alliance allows members to receive volunteering hours. How so? You must first sign up through the AGS website for the VIVO event. Then, submit a validation form through the Color a Smile website where shortly after, you will receive mailing instructions and the printable validation form. After receiving the drawings, they will respond with an email confirmation of service hours which you must submit to an AGS Google form. The best part is that you can do it all over again after you finish!

Coloring a drawing to remind people that they are not alone coursing through time and space, allows the formation of a personal bond due to the intention transmitted through the artwork. The appreciation responses are directed to the person whose name is placed on the bottom of the paper. This constantly reminds us that small actions can lead to such large impacts and most of the time, the smallest details are the ones that become most meaningful.
